Dadford with Stowe Parish Newsletter March - April 2024



Here we are again, with Easter fast approaching! And, oh dear, approaching even faster than the year before! On the gloomy side, that means, for some of us, another year has passed without our favourite football team getting any silverware. But it also means the arrival of a Festival that arouses much enjoyment - as well as awe, mystery, comfort and gratitude.

We each of us will have our own Easter memories, things that connect up in some way with the great Easter Festivals. I only have space to offer one. It's a little tenuous, perhaps, but still, after many years, strangely vivid.

It goes back all the way to a Primary School and a dreamy seven-year-old in a very orderly class of thirty or forty. It's the first lesson of the day, and our form mistress, with whom we spend most of our days – though, alas, her name now eludes me – always starts each one with a hymn, which she accompanies, concentrating hard, on a piano at the front. Alas, it's the same hymn every day. Month after month, it never alters. As predictably as night precedes day, our communal rendition of 'Praise, my soul, the King of Heaven' precedes the daily school register. Rather a large number of decades later, though one's memory is generally gamma minus rather than alpha plus, all the verses of that hymn lyric (played so thumpingly on what was probably a tired old piano) still come back without any effort at all. Not least, its beginning:

Praise, my soul, the King of Heaven. At His feet thy tribute bring. Ransomed, healed, restored, forgiven, Who, like thee, His praise should sing?

I would like to think I was not the only pupil that sang it mechanically, day after day, month after month, without any thought at all as to what the words actually meant. Certainly, it was a startling moment, perhaps at the age of ten, when I realised that the commas in the first line were, in fact, highly significant, and that I had definitely <u>not</u> been asking the King of Heaven to praise my soul at all. I guess many minds turned off because of the repetition. And the baffling nature of some of the words. That third line, in particular.

It was very well-intentioned of Mrs X to start off our days with a hymn. In retrospect, however, it would have been helpful if she could at least have given us some insights into that first verse. It would have been boring to introduce the hymn as an 1830s Christian version of a much older Jewish psalm. But perhaps she could have said that we're talking to our inner selves, reminding our inner selves to praise God, because Jesus came to earth and opened up to us the possibility of salvation? And then, perhaps, if she was feeling brave, she could have gently explored those four wonderful words: *ransomed, healed, restored* and *forgiven* and their relationship with the very first Easter? Alternatively, she might just have said, 'When you get to line 3, you're allowed a great big smile, because, believe me, it's good news!'

Easter, then, is an evocative time for memories. A time, too, when there won't just be chocolate bunnies to munch, and Fred Astaire and Judy Garland to admire, but also churches, their doors still wide, wide open in friendly welcome to all, their bells ringing cheerfully with great big smiles on their hidden faces as they cry out the amazing Easter message: *Ransomed*! *Healed*! *Restored*! *Forgiven*! The very message that doughty Mrs X, with at least one tune in her pianistic repertoire, wanted to ensure would not be quickly forgotten.

What's been happening at St. James and St. John Church of England Primary School

St. James and St. John School is a oneform entry school located in two villages. Foundation Stage, Year 1 and Year 2 children are taught

at the infant site in Akeley and Year 3 up to Year 6 are taught at the junior site in Chackmore.

With the lengthening of the days, spring feels just around the corner. At both sites the children have been expanding their learning and are looking forward to the opportunities the spring will bring! As we approach the end of the Spring term, it is a good time to reflect, not just on our achievements from the last term, but also on what we want to aspire to achieve over the rest of the academic year.

January is the perfect time for encouraging our pupils to try something new, and to build their resilience and perseverance when some things take longer to learn than others. Since the start of the academic year we have been developing our range of extracurricular clubs. From recorders to Lego, choir to chess, it has been fabulous seeing the children engaging in so many different activities and growing multiple skills. Our close connection to S4A, who run our wrap around care, means that this is extended throughout the whole day with their range of activities before and after school.

The Foundation children have been continuing with Forest school throughout January and February (the idea of there being no such thing as bad weather, just the wrong clothing is certainly playing true here!). The children have been fantastic at adapting to the differences in the weather and really enjoying the opportunity to experience the changes in the natural world every week. At the end of January the Chackmore children enjoyed a 'Comfy Day' where in return for a small donation, they were allowed to wear pyjamas, athletic clothing or onesies, along with slippers in school! Hot chocolate was also served at breaktime with the help of the PTFA. It was certainly a different way to end the month!

The start of February was the NSPCC's Numbers Day, which featured a day of maths related activities, along with an inter class, and school, TTRockstars (a times table practising website and app) competition. The children came dressed with numbers on or as a rockstar, with donations being made to the NSPCC. The start of February also heralded the PTFA run school disco. With separate events for the Akeley and Chackmore children, the song suggestions came flooding in and we enjoyed seeing the children take to the dance floor!

After half term we look forward to World Book Day, the annual event celebrating reading, books and love of stories. We enjoy seeing all the costumes the children come in and finding out about their favourite books. It is always fabulous to be recommended a new book or two by the children too!

The start of March is also Mothering Sunday, with the children at both sites creating something special for their mothers and working towards something equally special for our Mother's Day assemblies. Following on from this is Comic relief, which we are always pleased to support as a school, and the second round of the Key Stage 2 cooking competition, where our semifinalists have to design and make an interesting, healthy packed lunch. We wish them all luck!

Not long after this preparations for Easter will be underway. At the Akeley site, the Easter garden making activity remains an important tradition and we hope to have more Easter bonnets on show again too. Our term will end with our whole school day of celebration - our Easter extravaganza, involving crafts, activities and of course the message of the Easter story.
