Dear Friends

As we approach the equinox on 23 September, we lose nearly 4 minutes of daylight every day and we seem to be galloping towards autumn. By the end of October the clocks go back, making the days seem even shorter (although of course it makes no difference to the sun and the actual hours of daylight). There is a race against time to complete the harvest in the fields and to prepare

gardens for the winter. Personally I associate September with a usually doomed attempt to finish all the outdoor painting jobs I'd intended to do: ("we have left undone those things which we ought to have done . . . "). This imperative clashes in our house with our desire to gather as many blackberries as we can before Michaelmas. Tradition has it that Satan landed in some brambles when St Michael cast him out of heaven, so Satan spitefully spoiled any blackberries left after that date. Autumn has a distinct air of things finishing, of opportunities slipping away.

However, the academic "new year" starts in September, and Michaelmas on 29 September was traditionally the start of the farming year. The annual accounts were drawn up and labour hired for the year at the Michaelmas fairs - of which our Buckingham autumn fair is a descendant. It is the time when gardeners plan for next spring by planting bulbs, moving plants or planting new shrubs. Seed catalogues appear, and optimism triumphs over bitter experience as we once again order seeds. Perhaps next year what we grow will match the pictures in the catalogues. After this difficult dry summer, many gardens are looking very sorry for themselves and optimism is even more needed than usual.



So, yes, summer has gone and the darkest days of winter are approaching fast, with, this year, the threat of exorbitant fuel bills - but spring *will* come and we need to look forward and plan for next year. It is said that to plant a garden is to believe in the future. After all, God planted a garden in Eden.

Work has now been approved and will hopefully begin in the coming months at the Silverstone end of the village to install another speed hump. Permission was refused by **Bucks County Council road closure** department for the works to be carried out in July due to another diversion that was in the area. When it does begin, we are assured that this one will be more prominent than the raised tables that have been provided with the last road calming work. We shall also be installing an additional road speed sign which will indicate what speed vehicles are doing as they pass and this will be capable of storing data to indicate the amount and speed of traffic.

Nehemiah solves a problem


The work was going well. The walls of Jerusalem were being rebuilt. Each group and family had the responsibility of restoring a length of wall.

The person in charge was Nehemiah, a man of prayer who asked God for solutions to problems. Attacked by hostile tribes he organized the workers into two shifts, one to carry on building with a sword by their side and the other half to stand on watch fully armed. "So we built the wall till it reached half its height, for the people worked with all their heart."

Then there was a great outcry. The work on the walls stopped. The workers said they were suffering from bad harvests, punishing taxes and inflated prices. Nehemiah was angry that the richer people were treating the poorer people so harshly. He called a public meeting

and shamed the lenders into behaving with humanity.
"Give back to them immediately their fields, vineyards, olive groves and houses and also the exorbitant sums you are charging them."

He reminded them that the land was God's gift to them to share. With new enthusiasm they returned to the work. "The God of heaven will give us success. We His servants will start rebuilding."



Nehemiah's prayerful dependence on God gave him the moral authority and leadership skills to solve problems by teamwork. The walls and the community were rebuilt, the spirit of the people transformed and order and stability were established with a proper focus on God.

We can join in Nehemiah's prayer whenever we are uncertain: "Oh LORD, let your ear be attentive to the prayer of this Your servant."

We can trust Him to answer with what is best for us.

Dear family and friends

Hello from Kisoro!

I felt adequately recovered from my run in with Covid and pneumonia in order to fly back to Uganda about 10 days ago. After spending a night in Entebbe, I made the long road journey back to Kisoro. I arrived feeling far more tired and a little more breathless than I expected and I think that may be related to the altitude – Kisoro is at 2000m. I started back at work on Monday (13th). My plan is to work around half-time for a couple of weeks until I am back to full strength.

Part of the plan around my return is a new agreement between CMS and the Diocese of Muhabura (technically my Ugandan "employer") around limiting my hours of work, especially at night. I'm hopeful that a somewhat less arduous schedule might be better for me and make my presence here more sustainable.

The team at Potter's Village has kept the show on the road brilliantly while I was away. They definitely don't need me as much as they used to! That's great news because it means I can direct more time to other projects, although I will still be doing two days and a night each week at Potter's Village Medical Centre...and more when one of the clinical officers is on leave.

Even though I've only been back for a week, I've had a busy time at the

government hospital and squeezed in a visit to the Batwa in Mikingo Village. I received a very warm welcome in both places. I am hoping to do more of this community work over the next few months as Potter's



needs me less.

Kisoro is currently overwhelmed with refugees who have fled from the conflict just over the border in Congo. The population of the refugee camp is probably almost double the number of people who live in Kisoro town and services at the government hospital have been stretched to capacity. Although I had been a regular visitor to the refugee camp in the past, there are now numerous NGOs involved there, so I am not really needed at the moment. I will continue to look after refugee children who are sick or born prematurely at both Potter's Village and the government hospital until God gives clear direction on how else I should become involved.

I'm thankful for so many friends who have emailed in recent weeks to enquire about my health, check on my whereabouts and reassure me of your prayers. I am so sorry that I haven't been able to respond to each of you individually. I hope this update will answer your questions.

They provide a temporary home for babies whose mothers have died in childbirth, or who are mentally ill or who have been abandoned, until they can be resettled with either their own, or a foster, family. The Medical Centre provides high quality care for all local children, including premature babies.

A very sad sight this summer has been the damage to crops. The allotments and gardens have really suffered, with the drought causing poor cropping of vegetables, and flowers blooming for a much shorter time.

Vegetables and fruit will be in short supply which is disappointing for gardeners who had such high hopes after all the time spent preparing and planting earlier in the year. Hedges and trees are already starting to drop their leaves and some will not survive, but we won't know until next spring! Grass is no longer green but it will come back once it 'rains for forty days and forty nights'. Then it will be back to the weekly mow.
