If we revise history will we ever learn?

Referring to an article in the Spectator (22 October) penned by Charles Moore, I read that a consistory court in Salisbury has recently granted a Dorchester church authority to remove a memorial to John Gordon who became instrumental in quelling a dangerous slave rebellion in Jamaica during 1760. This ecumenical court held that whilst it acknowledged the monument's historical importance, it also contained clearly racist language, `...entirely inconsistent with Christianity's foundational understanding'. Moore observes; 'Is that correct? Surely 'Negroes' was the normal, neutral word then used.'

Whilst quelling a dangerous rebellion at a time when slavery was lawful Gordon, a devout christian, actually gained the respect of the slaves whom he chose to remove to another island rather than killing them. It seems that the above memorial was originally placed in the church; deserving of such an honour given the mercy he had shown in those troubled times. Consider what this courageous man did within the times in which he lived, rather than have his record removed due to a revisionist view of history.

To learn lessons of the past, can we really do so by revising them in retrospect? Consider Moses' actions in leading the Israelites against the Midianites (Numbers 31). Ought that lead asks Mr Moore, to Moses' statue being removed from the Medici Chapel?

From aiding our understanding of the present to preparing us for the future, we have much to learn from the realities of the past.

The death of Queen Elizabeth 11, 8 September 2022

The Queen of the United Kingdom and the other Commonwealth realms was the longest-reigning British monarch, she died of "old age" at Balmoral Castle in Aberdeenshire, Scotland, at the age of 96.

People at home and abroad mourned the death of the Queen. During the10 days of mourning she lay in State and the public were able to pay their respects.

At Stowe a book of condolences was opened for the congregation to write their personal messages and a card signed by members of Stowe Church was sent to the Palace for King Charles 3rd and his family.

The **death** of the Queen and coverage of her funeral topped the ranks of the mostwatched broadcasts **in** British **television** history, thousands of people flocked to London to pay their respects to Queen Elizabeth 11 during the 10 days of mourning. Among them were two of Stowe's congregation. Recalled by Charlotte Close-Smith.

"On Thursday 15th September my sister and I made our way to Southwark Park to join the lying in state queue.

We met our own "queue buddy " who had travelled from Guernsey that morning. Interestingly she had been in the crowds at the Queen's coronation and also attended Sir Winston Churchill's lying in state.

Having queued for just over 11 hours we went through the airport type security checks on Friday morning at 9 o'clock. The atmosphere immediately changed and there was total silence as we walked into the building.

There were four individual queues leading into Westminster Hall with people from all walks of life. We were fortunate enough to witness a changing of the guards which meant we were in the hall for an extra 15 minutes. This allowed us time for quiet reflection and to offer our own individual thanks and prayers for an exceptional Monarch."

We learned how the farm was sold by the Duke of Buckingham's estate and how the Davies family came to own it. Home farm was built as a 'model farm', and produced some championship beasts. This included two in particular, called the Duchess of Dadford and William a prize bull. High standards were kept and when Queen Victoria came to stay at Stowe House she was so taken by the butter produced in the dairy at the farm that when she returned to London, butter was sent up regularly for her. Jonathan's passion for Home Farm shone through and he brought many fascinating pieces of memorabilia for us to see. It was while he was working in Dadford he found his interest for bell ringing, encouraged and taught by his long time friend, Bill Yates, he continues his interest, and is now Steeple Keeper at St. Albans Cathedral. Jonathan also visits Stowe Church when he can and plays the organ, certainly raising the rafters. Our grateful thanks for such a fascinating talk and long may the memories live on
