Dear Friends

Thank you for the opportunity to introduce myself to you. My name in Hans Taling and in 2005 we moved into the North Buckingham Parish after my curacy at the parish church of Littleborough at the foot of the Pennines in the Diocese of Manchester.

Before coming to England to serve the Anglican Church, my wife (Trudi) and I lived in Barneveld in the Netherlands together with our 3 sons. At that time, I lectured in New Testament Theology at Azusa Theological Seminary (part of the VU - Vrije Universiteit, or Free University) in Amsterdam and taught RE at a secondary school for a few hours per week.

Some of my students were preparing to become RE teachers, hence my initial interest in teaching RE and to gain a better understanding of the issues facing RE teachers. To support other students who were studying to become pastors/ministers or missionaries, I was involved in the Anglican Church in Amsterdam. Trying to understand, at grassroot level, the issues facing those who share similar experiences, is one of my driving forces for being within the Church and helping it to function properly, because it is based on the principle of togetherness.

Having lectured on the Gospel of John, in particular, one of the characteristics of this Gospel is the emphasis Jesus put on togetherness and servanthood. Whereas the Synoptic Gospels (Matthew, Mark and Luke) describe the public appearances and acts of Jesus. In John's Gospel the main discourse is on the private and intimate talks Jesus had with the disciples. In these talks Jesus emphasised how the one was not more important than the other. In setting an example, Jesus even took the role as the servant in the household to wash the disciples' feet.

As servanthood and togetherness are such an important feature of what Jesus taught us, I hope that we are able to move forward unitedly with all who are living in Dadford and Stowe Parish and those who are "gathered" from further afield as members of Stowe Parish Church. Whilst the Queen will be attending a service of thanksgiving at St. Paul's cathedral on that day, we would like to invite all villagers to attend this event to share her celebrations in Dadford. In addition, the hall caters for many different types of events – exhibitions, craft fairs, weddings, wakes, film nights, speaker series, fund raising, art and photographic clubs, sport and fitness, fun and friendship.

The costs are extremely reasonable at £8.00 per hour for commercial events and £50.00 deposit or £4.00 per hour and £20.00 deposit for noncommercial events booked by residents of Stowe parish. November 21st -A widow's despair I Kings 1717-24

DADVENT LIGHT TRAIL, 1-31 December 2021

DADVENT was invented 4 years ago in an attempt to bring residents from different parts of the village together. The idea was to try and encourage as many people as possible to decorate their windows or gardens and, at 6pm each night, whoever wished could go and watch the lights switch on. We felt it might be a great way for everyone to meet and see each other whilst also brightening up Dadford.

We didn't know then how successful the event would be, what fabulous displays people would do or how much fun it would be to get together each evening and watch the windows and gardens light up. We have loved seeing your creations – big and small, handmade and shop-bought. All have been brilliant.

This year we would like to welcome the new families that have moved into the village and invite you all to join us in this village tradition. It's a great way to meet people...and the streets look amazing. This is how it works:

1.Have a think about where you could decorate and what it might be. You can do whatever you like but it must be visible from the street. Nobody comes onto your property unless you want them to. It really doesn't matter how big or small your display is, **THIS IN NOT A COMPETITION**. 2.Select a date (between 2-23 December) when you would like to switch your festive lights/display on and let us know. We may need to negotiate if someone else has taken the same date, so the sooner you let us know the better. DEADLINE FOR CONFIRMING THE DATE IS WEDNESDAY 17 NOVEMBER. Your number must be part of your display so that people can find you. We will put together the schedule and distribute it in November.

3.On the day of your 'launch', people will gather outside your house just before 6pm and count you in 10.9.8..... etc. Once the lights are on, they should ideally be left on between 5-8pm each night until 31 December. Of course, you can leave them on longer if you like.

Garden birds

If you haven't been feeding the garden birds throughout the year then now is the time to start feeding them. As natural feed sources diminish with the colder weather, many garden birds need help to survive the winter. Different species have different food requirements. Some are seed eaters, some carnivorous and some primarily vegetarian. Hardbills ie. finches will crack open seed whereas slender billed birds ie. robins and wrens like grubs and insects. So a good variety of foodstuffs should be made available to encourage as many different birds as possible.

Suitable food to put out would include some of the following:

Animal fats. Suet. Bacon rinds in short pieces. Mealworms and maggots. Fruit. Nuts, but NOT salted. Mixed seed, proprietary bought. Leftover boiled potato. Biscuit crumbs. Bread crumbs not slices or chunks. The list is almost endless.

Apart from peanuts, in feeders, we have found that the most popular feeds to be Sunflower Hearts and fat balls.

Challenge:See how many different species of birds you can see this winter.
