Naomi's grandson was King David. The line of David culminated in the redeeming love of Jesus on the cross.

## SCENES FROM VICTORIAN STOWE & DADFORD JOHN WARREN IN STOWE CHURCH, DECEMBER 1874

The Revd. John Warren felt great satisfaction as he looked round his little church, freshly decorated for Christmas. Along the front of the gallery, large and clear, was the text **THOU SHALT CALL HIS NAME JESUS**, beautifully set out in holly leaves on a bright red and blue background. (On Christmas Day from the pulpit the Reverend John would thunder the angel's great follow-up to Joseph: 'For he shall save his people from their sins'.) At one end of the bold text was a crown; at the other end, crossed keys. The thirty-year-old Reverend John had High Church leanings.

In its way, this Christmas Service could also be a celebration of his own first two years at Stowe. Everything that had happened in that time, apart from the poor Duchess's demise, had been most felicitous: the job as curate; the bonus of also being Domestic Chaplain to such an amenable and admirable Christian as the Third Duke; the imminent take-over from the startlingly rich vicar, the Revd. Uthwatt; and the according acquisition of a delightful vicarage (the large house where Dadford High Street meets the Dadford Road). He'd enjoyed his cricket, too. Apart from that match on the North Front against Maids Moreton, when, disappointingly, he had only made 2 and 1, though the visitors were three players short.

How different the church now looked! It had been something of a disappointment initially. Only recently, when officiating at a double wedding, when the elderly Stowe Head Carpenter, Henry Dunnett, had remarried at the same time that his grand-daughter had become the wife of the Master of the Duke's Fire Brigade, Warren had silently grieved at the church's spartan nature. Not a stained glass window anywhere. No seeming input from Stowe's two greatest, but godless, eighteenth-century grandees.

For Christmas, at least, the ancient pillars would be dramatic, twined all around in ivy. On the pulpit, most satisfactorily, was a triangle, symbol of the Trinity, made of straw, on a blue background, and edged with ivy leaves. Meanwhile, the front of the reading desk was ornamented with the word **ALLELUIA**, again in straw on blue. Below each window, most charmingly, were beds of moss with crosses and triangles made of flowers, and above the east window, usually so starkly empty, there was now an arch in red, with the text **GOD WITH US** writ large. And as the final *jeu d'esprit*, the font was now a striking green and white, decked out with immortelles on moss.

It was a pity the Third Duke would soon be off to Madras. Warren would miss his new boss, twenty years his senior. How awful it must have been when, at twenty-five, he was faced with Second Duke's debts of more than £1 million!. But such a turnaround! An improved water supply, a gas plant and hot-air heating! Good men appointed to run and restore his various estates, like the excellent Uttleys, newly arrived at Home Farm!

The junior John Uttley, of course, had helped Ann with all the church decorations. Warren's eyes twinkled hopefully. There would be a full-to-bursting church, ablaze with colour and sweet with the smell of fresh flowers! And his dear wife Ann, as ever, conjuring magic sounds from that squeaky harmonium! He smiled contentedly. It was time to dot the i's and cross the t's on his sermon. . .

#### **News from National Trust Stowe**



We had great success with the For Your Tomorrow exhibition, welcoming over 80,000 visitors over 6 weeks from October to mid-November and were delighted with the positive response from the public and stakeholders. The garden and Park team worked hard to put back and repair the garden after the event and then it was straight into Christmas.

We have also been hard at work over the Winter months with a lot of our main pruning within the garden and parkland being carried out. Leaf clearing around the garden is always high on our list of jobs too, to ensure a good display of our Winter and Spring flowers of Snowdrops, Aconites, Daffodils and Fritillaria.

One of our latest projects has been the restoration of Bellgate Lodge and its surrounding Landscape. Although the building was finished early last year the garden still needed restoration, so this Spring we will be putting in a Potagers style garden on the Parkland side of the lodge. On the garden side a Landscape style garden will be planted to tie in with the rest of the garden of the same period.

March 4th - Shrove Tuesday is a Christian Holy day that marks the beginning of Lent, a traditional 40-day period of fasting and prayer leading up to Easter. The word "shrove" comes from the Roman Catholic practice of "shriving," or confessing sins.

What is the story behind pancake Tuesday?

Pancake Day is the Tuesday before the Christian period of Lent;
a traditional time of fasting and restraint. The idea of making
pancakes likely came from a desire to use up the 'forbidden'
ingredients (fat, eggs, etc) before the Lenten fast began.
