Dear Friends,

For so I call anyone who has goodwill towards me. Recently I sat alone in the interval of a concert. Everyone had left to get a drink and fresh air outdoors. I could not fight the crowds. Then three acquaintances in succession came to sit and talk with me. How I appreciated their kindness and company! It reminded me of Job, isolated, overwhelmed by troubles, stripped of his wealth, his family, and his health. Four friends came to console him in his misery but their helpful explanations for the calamity that had befallen him only accentuated his misery and bewilderment. Despite Job's obvious irritation at their lack of understanding they sat with him for seven days and seven nights.

Friends share the good times and the bad. Jesus gathered a group friends who walked and talked with Him over three years. With awe they saw Him heal the blind, the lame, the sick and despairing. They saw the enthusiastic crowds surrounding Him, they heard lawyers question Him, they felt His rebukes when they presumed too much. They saw one friend deviate and join a plot to kill Jesus. They vanished when danger threatened. "Even my best friend, the one I trusted most, the one who shared my bread, has turned against me," said David (Psalm 41,9.) Jesus knew the bitterness of betrayal yet continued to love them.

The Bible tells us of other friendships. James wrote, ' "Abraham believed God, and because of his faith God accepted him as righteous." And so Abraham was called God's friend.' Another friend was Moses. "The Lord would speak to Moses face to face, just as someone speaks with a friend, (Exodus 33,11). David and Jonathan were great friends despite Jonathan's father's murderous hatred of David. Jonathan's loyalty made David's escape possible. We remember the love and respect of Ruth for Naomi and the joy shared by Mary and Elizabeth.

What affinity was there between a Jewish tentmaker and a non-Jewish doctor? Perhaps an eagerness to teach a new approach to life and a Greek curiosity to learn a new philosophy. Paul and Luke travelled many miles together seeing new places, meeting new people, facing challenges to their safety and they became great friends who trusted, encouraged and admired each other's qualities. Luke shared a prison cell for two years with Paul in Caesarea and was a faithful companion when Paul was in prison in Rome. Paul called him "our dear doctor," "the beloved physician." Such friends are rare and to be cherished. God has given us friends to sweeten our lives. We have one faithful, loyal, forgiving, wise Friend whom we can talk to at any time in total confidence. "I am with you always, to the end of time," He promised.

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Family Services July 13th -

Luke 10, 25-37 Cruelty and kindness

Luke was a doctor; Paul a tent-maker. Together they journeyed along what is now the southern coast of Turkey. Paul had a purpose for his journey. Together they visited many places and **Paul** took every opportunity to tell the people the good news of Jesus' love and forgiveness. Luke probably listened, observed and made notes of what Paul said and of the people who came to listen. Luke noticed God's love shining through in parables, sayings and stories of Jesus.

He heard of a day when a lawyer asked Jesus a question to see what kind of answer He would give -"Who is my neighbour?" Jesus' reply left it to the lawyer to answer his own question. He told the story of four men setting off separately from Jerusalem to travel to Jericho about 17 miles away down a deep descent through desolate country. The first man was attacked, stripped and left for dead. Later a second man came by, a priest, who feared to make himself ceremonially unclean by touching the bloodied man so walked away on the other side. A second man, learned in the Law, also saw the abandoned man, went over to have a good look and distanced himself from contamination.



Along came a third man, a Samaritan, despised by the Jews, who took immediate action, brought oil and wine to disinfect his wounds, put him on his donkey, carried him to the nearest inn, paid for his care and promised to settle the full cost on his return.

What would our answer be if we turned the lawyer's guestion round - "To whom am I a neighbour?"

August 10th - Luke 12, 32-40 Travel light

From Paul, Luke learned of another approach to life -Don't be anxious about food and drink and clothes. Don't be dominated by possessions. Jesus said, " Take no bag for your journey, or extra tunic or sandals or staff but rely on what you earn as you go." Instead, seek the real riches that do not fail, found in purses that do not grow old. Wealth is temporary but the treasures of the Kingdom of God are permanently available and you do not leave them behind when you die.

REMEMBERING MARY RUTH CONNOR - 20th February 1929 - 18th May 2025

There have been many very moving services of commemoration in St Mary's over the years, but the one on 9 June 'celebrating the life of Mary Ruth Connor' was surely one that will stay with everyone who was there for the rest of their lives. The absolutely packed church that Monday afternoon and the magnificent gathering at the National Trust restaurant afterwards were tokens of how very special the joyful and humble Mary had been, not just to our lucky selves, but to so very many others over the best part of a hundred years. Though, most sadly, she is no longer with us, she will surely live on vividly in so many grateful memories. As Clare Jensen and Sam Silk expressed it in their heartfelt talk: 'Mary has and will continue to be an inspiration. Her kind, gentle nature, but equal strength and stoicism, along with her pragmatic approach, could only be looked up to. And her wholesome morals and honest values held on to. We are here today not only to say goodbye to our darling friend but to remember the world is a better place for her being.' The Riding School, of course, was central to the happy life she shared with her dear brother: 'Throughout Mary and Theodore's lives, they gave countless opportunities to those who wanted to ride. . . Life at the Kennels was like stepping back in time. Nothing ever changed, the one constant in an ever-busy world. The joy given to so many is immeasurable, and we can only be thankful that Mary was there to enrich our lives.'



Six ponies met the hearse at the bottom of the drive and followed Mary all the way to the stables, through the grounds to Bellgate and past the lakes up to the church.

Everything about her Service felt right. The choice of hymns – 'Morning has Broken', 'Amazing Grace' and 'All Things Bright and Beautiful' – was perfect. The short poetic tributes written and read by Julie Bradshaw and Rhiannon Witney touched the heart of things. So, too, Caroline Conquest's reading of 'Love Lives On'. From Clare and Sam's devoted magnum opus we had many new insights, not least the two proposals of marriage that Mary once had; one, tragically, from a young man who did not return from service in the Second World War. We were reminded, too, of the devoted regularity of Mary's swift walks on Sundays from The Kennels to and from St Mary's. Our church meant much to her, just as it had meant much to her parents, who both served as churchwardens and members of the PCC.

Underpinning the whole service was the heartening message from the Revd. Cathy (who had visited Mary only days before she died and whose own

children had enjoyed rides with her), reminding us with great clarity that a loving God gifted the world His Son, and that whoever believes in Him will not, in fact, perish but have eternal life.

We rejoice in an earthly life lived so to the full. We rejoice that even when disability and suffering overtook her, Mary was blessed with a whole band of wonderful helpers and carers, led by the devoted Sally Wells. Though understandably weighed down with a strong sense of loss, we rejoice that Mary is now, so deservedly, in glorious peace.
