When they've blown away, each church goes on, its vibrant faith in constant flow, Telling how a Saviour might receive us, though autumn leaves come and go.

October 12th - Luke 17, 11-19 The rarity of gratitude

A group of lepers met Jesus as He walked towards Jerusalem on the border between Samaria and Galilee. What they had in common was their dreaded skin disease. The Jews had strict laws about separating lepers from healthy people. Lepers had to wear torn clothes, leave their hair uncombed, cover the lower part of their faces, call out "Unclean", and distance themselves from healthy people. Their only comfort was to band together with other lepers and rely on donations left at a safe distance. Such were the people whom Jesus met, desperate to be cured, who called out, "Master, have pity on us". Jesus' response was simple, their response was immediate. On their way to report to the priest they were cured. Only one of them noticed his clean skin and immediately turned back to thank Jesus. He was a Samaritan, despised by the Jews.

PETER'S FIRST EPISTLE & POSSIBLE **BITHYNIAN RESPONSES**

A summer heat-wave is perhaps a good time for something slightly whimsical! Peter's First Epistle, for example, stirs up thoughts in the summer heat of the people who received it. Was it similarly hot on the shores of the Black Sea when it arrived? Or freezingly cold in the town of Nicaea, when later generations, under pressure from their Roman overlords, were being reminded of what it had said? And what was the reaction of the recipients?

Peter's powerful introduction surely caused huge excitement, gaining immediate attention: 'Peter, an apostle of Christ, to God's elect, strangers in the world...chosen for obedience to Jesus Christ...'.

Perhaps different parts of the letter elicited different responses, as they addressed the strong call for them to respond not in silence but vocally: 'You are a chosen people... a people belonging to God, that you may declare the praises of Him who called vou out of darkness...'

Maybe one of two of them might even have responded in verse, homing in on sections in the letter that they thought particularly helpful or challenging? Here, then, are three little attempts at expressing what they might have expressed all those years ago:

LIVING STONES

From the first half of Chapter Two.

Though we are strangers in a land Where emperors as gods are known. We're *stones* to build a house that's planned With Jesus Christ the Cornerstone

We're *living stones* - a sturdy Called out of darkness as God's own Into a wondrous, special light, A light His Mercy's kindly shown.



So let us praise, both day and night, Our Chosen One, our Cornerstone.

Others might have been particularly struck by the two verses in Chapter 3 (verses 8 & 9). They offer so much. Someone, for example, might have thought up a short jingly ditty to stress two adjectives, 'compassionate' and 'humble', that he or she felt could be particularly important in effecting the special new life they were trying to lead.

Dear Friends

As I sit down to write this letter, I am, yet again, in awe ofGod's goodness and faithfulness. I have been very aware of his protection and his unchangeable nature in the past few months, which have been characterised by change and disruption.

Based in Juba, the capital of South Sudan, I divide my time between supporting the establishment of a neonatal service and


training future paediatricians at the Al Sabah Children's Hospital, and working in basic health care at Gorom Refugee Settlement. South Sudan has the highest rates of maternal and infant mortality in the world and fourth highest rates of both infant and child deaths, so good paediatric care is desperately needed.

I trained as a doctor in South Africa before moving to the UK where, after almost 20 years in the NHS (including nearly 10 years as a consultant neonatologist) I returned to Africa on a short term placement with

CMS in Kisoro, Uganda. That short term placement extended to almost seven years before leaving the work in the hands of an exceptional local team and moving on to a new adventure in South Sudan.

I've been encouraged to hear recent mission stories from around my wider area of work. In Ukraine, families are being assured they are not alone amid the hardship of war, and my colleagues in Paraguay have seen a young man overcome challenges to learn academically and spiritually.
