Dadford with Stowe Parish Newsletter November - December 2025



Nonetheless, there are pluses. I should be grateful for the changing seasons; a reminder of God's order and provision, even if we are messing about with the climate. In the Tropics there is little variation in the seasons. The TV weatherman in 1970's Jamaica, usually, only had two mantras (to choose from) in the forecast-"fair to fine" or "fine to fair"!

Another plus is that Autumn not only brings a change from Summer, but, also, brings such wonderful colours, as the leaves fall, besides the fruits for which we thank God in Harvest services. A third plus is that, now, in the Christian calendar, we can anticipate Advent and the coming of our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ. We can relish, reflect on and chew over the wonder of the depth of His love for us - such flawed and rebellious creatures. There's the wonder of His humble entry into the world (no razzamatazz or exalted status) and the wonder of his birth to a simple believing Jewish girl, soon to be a refugee, in a stable in Bethlehem in Judaea - a remote and insignificant part of the Roman Empire. He came to bring forgiveness, His presence and His power to believers. This is an event to be celebrated not with excess of food, drink & presents, but with grateful rejoicing hearts.

Nepal News. September 2025

Uprising in Nepal

The Government initially shut down all media platforms which resulted in mass demonstrations by the youth. Tragically 21 young people were shot dead and the situation escalated, with many protests across the country against government corruption. Major national government buildings have been burnt including the Parliament, Ministries, the Presidential residence and numerous District Administration offices; the Prime minister resigned, and a curfew was put in place in Kathmandu.

Things now have quietened down (72 people died), and a new interim Prime minister has been installed. The first woman Prime Minister, former chief justice. She will lead the transitional government until elections take place on 6th March 2026.

Please pray for all the youth, that the new government supports them and creates new jobs.

Pray for peace and no violence in the run up to the elections; pray that Christians will be still allowed freedom and not be persecuted.

The National Trust reports that they have had a difficult few months with drought and the trees have really suffered. One of the first indications that a tree is stressed is through the

leaves, they can become yellow very early on and can even drop well before Autumn begins. The Beech trees are more susceptible to this as they are shallow rooted trees unlike Oak trees which have large tap roots and so can easily access water lower down in the soil. Most of the trees should recover and as long as when they drop their leaves, even early, they have buds ready for Spring they should survive.

In other news, the first weekend in October we celebrated our Harvest Weekend at New Inn. It is a community engagement event to celebrate the Harvest we have had across the portfolio. I also included flowers and other fruits and nuts from the portfolio such as Crab Apples, sweet chestnuts, conkers and pumpkins and a home-made bread wheatsheaf in our display. We have had an incredible harvest of fruit and it was lovely to share this with visitors, who could purchase a bag of apples, pears, damsons and sloes for a donation. Along the same theme we will be having fun with blessing the orchards with our annual Wassail on Sunday 25th January too, to make sure we have a good crop again next year!

We finished the half term with a 'Break the Rules' day. A popular event, where the children could pay to break various rules including crazy hair, funky socks and trainers for the day.

As we move towards December and Christmas we look forward to another half term, bursting with fun and exciting learning opportunities, including school trips to the National Space Centre in Leicester for Year 5 and to the Story Museum in Oxford for Year 4. We also have annual events of our Remembrance Service at the Chackmore site in November, as well as Christmas events at both sites, including the annual whole-school trip to the panto at the end of the term- oh yes we do!
